A Message From Your Stop Human Trafficking Committee

Did you know that there are 2.5 million child sex slaves in the world today? Are you aware that Child Trafficking is the fastest growing crime in the world and that 600,000-800,000 people are bought and sold across international borders each year; 50% are children, most are female?

Human Trafficking or "modern day slavery" is a global phenomenon that involves obtaining or maintaining the labor or services of another person through the use of force, fraud, or coercion. These human rights violations can occur in the forms of commercial sex (sex trafficking) and forced labor such as domestic servitude, factory or agricultural work.

Three years ago, Soroptimist International of the Americas launched a federation-wide campaign to raise awareness about the sex trafficking of women and girls. Despite this work, not enough people are informed, outraged and fighting against sex slavery. More needs to be done to identify victims, assist their rehabilita-

tion, prevent slavery from happening, and advocating for better laws and enforcement.

Soroptimist International of Corona has stepped up their campaign this year and you are all welcomed to attend our Committee meetings which will be the first Wednesday of each month at 11 a.m. before our regular meeting. We are laying the groundwork for our future involvement and welcome your input.

Stop Human Trafficking Partnership—A Call for Involvement

We have joined forces with other Soroptimist Clubs in San Bernardino and Riverside Counties since some are a few years ahead of us in their work. Riverside County, through the Sheriff's Department, was awarded a \$500,000 grant to combat local human trafficking and exploitation. Through the grant, a partnership between the Riverside County Sheriff's Department and Operation SafeHouse lead the county's first task force facing this hidden epidemic. It is the new Riverside County Anti-Trafficking Task Force and we

are awaiting direction as to our participation.

Corona Police Department will be trained by fellow Soroptimist, Shawn Dredla; both of whom are the most important components in our local environment.

We participate in the Inland Empire Human Trafficking meetings in Corona through Crossroads Christian Church.

Hopefully, you were able to attend our awareness program facilitated by Jennifer O' Farrell on January 26th.

Our committee is organizing a

movie night where we will get together to view a movie that will increase our awareness and help us to become more alert and sensitive.

We are organizing a segment in the Dreams & Decisions' program as part of "prevention" for our 7th and 8th grade girls. There is a call for participation with San Bernardino to provide basic necessities for rescued victims

Did you know...

According to a National Violence Against Women survey, in the united States alone, an estimated 5.3 million acts of domestic violence occur each year against women 18 years and older (U.S. Centers for Disease Control). In addition, 1 in 4 women will experience intimate partner abuse at some point in their lives (National

Network to End Domestic Violence). There is a growing concern that the widespread loss of jobs and livelihoods in other countries due to the global economic downturn will increase threats to women and girls' personal security and exacerbate levels of violence and sexual assault. This is already showing up in reports from shelters and hotlines in some countries. A May 2009 survey of more than 600 domestic violence shelters across the U.S. found that 3 out of 4 reported and increase in women seeking help for abuse since September 2008, when the economic downturn became serious (Indes Albertdi, UNIFEM).

This morning I was up to my knees and elbows in dirt. On purpose. I spent about 3 hours digging, weeding, building and grubbing around to get an area on the side of my house ready for me to plant Sweet Peas.

I love Sweet Peas. They are fragile and beautiful. The fragrance is intoxicating and the mass of color is breath-taking. I have loved them forever. I wish I could remember when my love affair with them began. I am guessing that my "supergardener" Grandma must have been the first one to introduce me to this glorious flower.



I decided to finally plant some of my own when my son, Andrew, announced that his wedding to the beautiful Ashley would occur on April 30th. A true spring wedding! "Could I possibly grow sweet peas for the rehearsal dinner?" I asked myself. Well, nothing ventured, nothing gained so I brought some chicken wire home, talked my husband, Mark, into helping me staple gun it to the fence, mixed and mulched the soil and then I brought out these cute little, brightly-colored packets of seeds that I ordered off the internet. The seeds have really cute names like, "Perfume Delight", "Jack and Jill" and "Color Palette Cupid". Don't they sound lovely?



I poured the seeds into a little bowl so I wouldn't lose any of them. Looking at this bowl with a few seeds resting at the bottom was kind of disheartening. The seeds were tiny and brown. Actually they looked just liked dried up old peas. You know when you are sweeping behind your kitchen table and there, kind of half hidden under the carpet you find an old, dried up pea that must have rolled off someone's plate (not possibly on purpose...). That's what these seeds looked like. And I am thinking, "How can this little seed POSSIBLY grow into the gorgeous 6 feet high massive vine of incredible flowers that I am determined to grow?" Well, without good soil, good water and sunlight they wouldn't. She investigates, asks questions, and shares her passion with other women in other clubs. She has contacted government and police agencies, she has attended meetings with churches – based organizations. In other words, she's tilling the ground and planting the seeds.

We've seen this happen with our signature Service Project, *Dreams and Decisions*. We've seen it happen with our fantastic fund raising event, *Chocolate*, *Wine and Jazz*.

We are so glad they have joined us to serve woman and girls in need. We look forward to getting to know each of you better.



A Recipe to Die for...by Deb Miller

WHITE TRASH

2 cups or I regular jar of dry roasted peanuts, lightly salted 2 bags of NESTLE'S white chocolate chips (Hint: The cheaper brands are waxier and do not melt and mix well) I box of Golden Graham cereal

Put cereal in a large metal bowl and put in the oven at 100 degrees while you melt the chocolate.

Follow the directions on the chocolate bag to melt the chips.

When the chocolate is melted, get the bowl of cereal out of the oven and add the peanuts on top of cereal.

Add the melted chocolate and mix well. The peanuts are heavier and tend to sink to the bottom so mix well. This takes a few minutes to cover the cereal and peanuts. The warm bowl keeps the chocolate from

setting too quickly.

Spread mixture out on a cookie sheet to dry. Just set it on the counter ~ no need to refrigerate.

Break apart into bite size pieces after the chocolate sets.

Did you know...

Teen Dating Violence...Dating and intimate relationships are a normal part of growing up for many adolescents. Yet teenagers frequently form their first romantic relationship without a clear understanding of what constitutes a healthy versus and unhealthy relationship. As a result, they are particularly vulnerable to becoming targets of dating abuse. Fifty-seven

percent of teens know someone who has been verbally, physically, or sexually abusive in a dating relationship. Moreover, females ages 16 to 24 are more vulnerable to intimate partner violence than any other age group. Although the patters and signs of teen dating violence tend to mirror those exhibited in adult abusive relationships, there are some

unique issues that teens face. A Soroptimist white paper examines those unique issues as they relate to the factors that influence teen dating violence, as well as the consequences thereof. The paper also addresses the unique obstacles teens face when seeking help and/or deciding to end an abusive relationship.
