Tracy Mauser's Cheese Spinach Squares

⅓ cup butter

3 large eggs

I cup of flour

I cup milk

½ teaspoon of salt

I teaspoon of baking powder I pound monterey jack cheese,

grated

2 10 ounce packages of chopped spinach (thaw and squeeze dry)

Melt butter in 9x13 baking dish. In bowl, beat eggs; add flour, milk, salt and baking powder. Mix to blend.

Add cheese and spinach and mix well.

Spread into baking dish and bake at 350° for 35 minutes. Cool for 30 minutes before cutting into squares.

Did you know...

Soroptimist launched the Violet Richardson Award program in 2000 as a way to recognize girls for their volunteer service to their communities. The program honors young women between the ages of 14 and 17 whose volunteer efforts include: helping other disadvantaged girls; fighting drugs, crime

and violence; cleaning up the environment; and working to end discrimination and poverty. The program is named after Violet Richardson Ward, the first president of the first Soroptimist club. Richardson Ward was committed to creating opportunities for girls and young women through her

affiliations with Soroptimist, the Girl Scout Council and the American Association of University Women. Her passion for volunteer service, particularly as it affected women and girls, has been an inspiration to Soroptimists throughout the years.

Cyndi Monroe: Making Waves

A Fall of Fulfillment

This fall is an amazing time in our country and an even more amazing time to be a woman. No matter what your political leanings, it cannot be denied that women all over the country are making their political presence known in a way we have never seen before. There's this palpable sense of empowerment sweeping from California to New York, Minnesota to Nevada that is incredibly exciting. Women of all ages, backgrounds, experience and financial means are stepping up to the challenge of having a voice in what America's future is going to look like: It's fantastic!

It has encouraged me to have the conversation about what I can do. Increasingly the conversation I have with myself centers on making a difference in my community. Looking at the women making headlines on the national stage makes it seem more and more plausible for me to do something significant. Still, knowing what to do or where to start is often what trips up a person like me. That's why I love my Soroptimist Club: it's a place where opportunities to make a significant difference flourish. The Soroptimist mission statement, "to improve the lives of women and girls" isn't just a slogan; it's a guide line we use as we roll up our proverbial sleeves and work to make those words become flesh and blood reality.

I suppose this is a good time to make a confession – I'm not really a joiner. While I understand the value of networking groups, it's not something I've ever really considered doing. Like most women, my life is overwhelmingly full. As the founder/president of a non-profit youth arts education organization I spend much of my time trying to figure out how to keep our fragile organization viable in this ridiculous economy. Still, I was drawn to Soroptimists precisely because it is not a networking club but truly a service organization dedicated to making a difference.

So here I am in a group of completely diverse women: Politically, socially, and educationally. We come from different backgrounds, we represent all kinds of different faiths, we are married, single, divorced, widowed. Some of us are mothers of young children, some have children grown, some are grandmothers. We run the spectrum of business women: Some work in city government, while some are bankers, small business owners, real estate agents, educators, or in all levels of management. Honestly, we couldn't be more different but the one thing that unites us is the call to service, the call to significance. In our own lovely community of Corona, we Soroptimist girls have committed ourselves to really making a difference in the lives of women and girls. Through our *Dreams and Decisions* program for jr high girls, our Women's Opportu-

nity Scholarship Award for a woman working her way through school as she supports her family, our Stop Sexual Trafficking awareness program, our high school scholarship program and on and on, Soroptimist International of Corona is making a significant mark in the community and beyond.

So I've found a wonderful place to give my desire for significant contribution a platform and a voice. While I probably will never find myself in the national political arena like so many women are today, I may very well be inspiring some young woman in Corona to take those steps to pursue that dream through the programs and scholarships offered by my Soroptimist Club. And what could be more significant than that?

Tracy Mauser's Corn Bread Soufflé

- I 12oz can sweet cream corn I 12oz can whole kernel corn
- I small box Jiffy corn muffin mix
- I stick butter
- I egg
- I cup sour cream

Preheat oven to 375 degrees

Mix and place in a 1.6 liter corning soufflé dish. [I find that it's better to put it in a bigger dish that's a little emptier than a smaller dish that is almost overflowing.]

Cook time: ~ I hour at high altitude or ~ 45 minutes at sea The time will vary with the weather: cook until light jiggling of center is possible with a tap on the dish. Allow to cool 20 minute to solidify.
